# Super Saturday Success: Enrollment Gets Boost Thanks to Weekend Hours

In an effort to boost Spring 2016 enrollment, Merritt offered current and new students three Super Saturdays

(Jan. 16, 23, and Feb. 6) to allow them the extra time to register in an on-the-spot process or to update any issues which may be preventing them from continuing. According to Dean Romeo Garcia, preliminary numbers show that on those three days, 150 students went through Admissions, 90 got help with Counseling and 90 with Financial Aid, 43 completed Assessment, and 25 went through Orientation.

"The Super Saturdays were a big success," says Dean Garcia. "Students were very appreciative of the extra time we gave them. "New students were able to complete the registration process and current students could complete such in-person tasks as removing holds on their accounts." Dean Garcia also applauded Merritt's Student Services staff who showed their commitment to student success by working on Super Saturdays. Microscopy's signature CraigsList-driven Open Houses were a success once again, with the last of the three bringing more than 40 potential students. Says instructor and program guru Gisele Giorgi, "It was the usual



exciting mix of backgrounds that makes community colleges so exciting. Some students were new to college and even to biology, a lot were re-entry students, a few had other degrees (BS, MS, MD). We had folks from Morocco, Serbia, and Russia, but mostly from Oakland. We had two previous students who have jobs in the field, but are interested in further training in histotech."

Gisele also reports on an exciting partnership with Dewey High School that stems from Microscopy Mentors (a CPT grant project). "Our incredible MMP mentors, Cristina Watson, Angela

Lane, Lashawn Fountain and Jacob Loffsner (aka Jacobo Fonzarelli) have been working with an amazing Dewey High School biology instructor, Erinn Godfrey, to provide curriculum and in-class co-teaching for three of her classes for several weeks. The students are solving a forensics case (a dognapping) by using microscopy skills. In February, instructor Cliff Cockerham will work with the Dewey students on a module that ties in asthma, climate change, and environmental racism. Much thanks to George Alonzo of OUSD, and Dean Rachel Antrobus for making this happen. It's been eye-opening and transformative for our team, and hopefully it is also a remarkable experience for the Dewey students."

### Merritt Women's Basketball Player is 6th to be Inducted into CCAA Hall of Fame




Women's Basketball Coach Fred Brown is proud to announce that Merritt's sixth player/coach has been chosen for the state's California Collegiate Athletic Association (CCAA) Women's Basketball Hall of Fame. Audrey (Moore) Jones, who played for Merritt between 1986 and 1988, will be inducted into the 2016 Hall of Fame at the Banquet of Champions at the State Tournament on March 10, at the Double Tree/Hilton Hotel in Pleasanton.

Audrey is a 1986 graduate of McClymonds High School in Oakland, attended Merritt from 1986-88, and went on to graduate from Oregon State University in 1991. She is one of 13 children and the first to graduate from a four-year university. As an athlete at Merritt, she played both point guard and off guard on two championship teams, according to Coach Brown, who nominated her. "She hit a game-winning "3" to put Merritt in the State Final 8 at ARC and was a major factor in leading Merritt to a 51-17 record and two championships in two different conferences and to the State Finals." And, he adds, as outstanding as Audrey was on the court, she was just as outstanding in the classroom. "She has continued her passion for helping others and has a full-time job working in probation in the Sacramento area while raising two children with her husband."

Coach Brown should know how it feels to achieve this honor. He was inducted into the Hall of Fame in 1998, followed by then-Coach Inga Marciulionis in 1999. The other three are Yasmin Gray and Tiddra Hardy in 1996 and Jurate Zukauskaite in 2002. Congratulations to all!

# **Assessment Update: The Communication ILO**

At the end of the fall semester, Merritt College faculty met to discuss their assessment of the Communication ILO (Intended Learning Outcome). About 20 faculty from a wide variety of disciplines brought samples of student work and scoring rubrics that allowed us to consider student achievement in the areas of written and oral communication.

The faculty participants aggregated the data from the scoring rubrics and found that students were exceeding expectations in their understanding of the assignment but needed to work on the mechanics of their writing and speaking. Specific areas identified as needing improvement included building confidence, punctuation, citation mechanics, and appropriate vocabulary usage. As a group, we identified two important actions to focus on during the spring semester. First, the group will work collaboratively to develop an ILO rubric that can be shared college-wide; student success will improve if students have consistent, clear expectations from all instructors. Second, the ILO will be revised to include communication using visual aids; the ILO will now read: "Communicate with clarity and precision using oral, visual, and/or written language, expressing an awareness of audience, situation, and purpose."

This spring, we will turn our attention toward the assessment of our Quantitative Reasoning ILO. If you are teaching a course that maps to this outcome, please watch your email for a call to participate. --Jennifer Shanoski
