

Students will be able to: Outline the research process and describe different methods used within the discipline
of Sociology.

Students showed an outstanding amount of growth in this area. Many students were uncomfortable with the idea of the research process initially, however, after engaging in several database searches students began to feel that writing a research paper was an attainable goal.

• Students will be able to: Apply the "Sociological Imagination" in analyzing the ways that societies influence individual and group life.

Many students were able to relate well to this idea that our individual experiences are often shaped by the wider culture. Students were asked to share an experience they had in which a choice they made was influenced by societal pressure.

• Students will be able to: Distinguish among, and describe, different systems of social stratification and analyze how they create social inequalities.

Social stratification, or categorization into rankings, proved to be a sensitive subject for many students. Students were, generally, acutely aware of systems of these ranking systems even if they weren't able to identify them, initially, by name. Students showed great knowledge of how factors such as income, race, and education all play a key role in contributing to social inequalities.

• Students will be able to: Compare and contrast different forms of social institutions.

Students were able to identify that different social institutions and were asked to identify how these institutions continued the cycle of inequity. Guided discussion regarding this topic was useful as many students were unaware of this general concept.
