Exploring and Normalizing Implicit Bias and the Race Nexus Dialectic: What Will We Do About It? - Invited speaker: Dr. Ammar Saheli

This brief professional development segment will explore the nuance of implicit bias and one of its primary manifestations of racial gaze and assumption. Trauma Informed Practice: How to Work Toward Safety and Security during COVID-19 - Brooke Briggance Trauma can occur on many levels and happens over time. In trauma, the brain can be overwhelmed, can be significantly impacted and the repercussions of that impact can present in the body as increases in heart disease, diabetes, substance use, auto-immune disease, mental illness and so much more. Trauma is a public health crisis that is also felt in our communities and institutions. Systemic racism, health disparities and poverty complicate the brain's ability to heal and rebuild neural pathways after individual trauma while perpetuating collective traumas. How we as individuals and systems respond to trauma matters; either by being retraumatizing and stigmatizing, or by being transformational and healing. We have choices about how to react. As we all battle the implications of toxic stress during COVID-19, now more than ever we need to develop individual and organizational responses to trauma that support people and communities in healing.
