From Classroom to Creek: Tomas Rossi's Introductory Biology 10 Class Gets Closer to Nature

In mid April, my Introductory Biology class traveled the three miles from Merritt College campus to the

exotic and little-known wilderness of Sausal Creek, located in the center of Oakland. Underneath the canopy of trees that bent and arched overhead, the class split into two groups—one investigated elements of the water quality of the creek and the other gathered samples of the insect species present in the creek. Kathleen Harris, a volunteer with "Friends of Sausal Creek," who served as guide and facilitator for the trip, provided instruction on both data gathering and interpretation. Both the water quality and the particular mix of insect species found suggested that the creek was reasonably healthy at the time. The students found the work both relaxing and exhilarating, as the sound of the flowing water provided a pleasant background. Merritt Students Will Be Heading to China on June 10 for a Two-Week Study Scholarships



The lives of five lucky Merritt students are about to change. On June 10, Myeisha "My" Williams, Ajari McCaster, Michael Lanza, Alicia Castaneda, and Shadie Lee will be leaving for a study trip to China where they will visit three cities, Beijing, Hangzhous and Shanghai, and attend classes in local universities. The China Scholarship Trip came about as a partnership between the Peralta Community College District and the China-United States Exchange Foundation and

Wanxiang Grup Corporation who were targeting college students from the Congressional Black Caucusmember districts. From all four colleges, 21 students were chosen. During their stay, they will receive lectures on Chinese history, language, culture, economic development, and other relative topics presented by credentialed Chinese scholars and also get some sightseeing in!

One of the travelers, My Williams, is ecstatic about this opportunity. "It's been a dream of mine to travel outside of the country," said My, who is ASMC president and an intern in Congresswoman Barbara Lee's office, and will be heading to Mills College in the fall to study public policy. "I plan to learn more in-depth information about China's economic development to translate it into action plans for my marginalized communities. I know that this trip will be an enriching experience and a milestone in my career and development as a leader and a scholar.'

Audrey Trotter to Retire But Will Always Keep her Passion for Community Colleges

It wasn't until after Audrey Trotter had graduated from college, taught elementary school, and worked in her dad's business for several years that she ever heard of a community college.

But when she finally did, she became so passionate about the community college mission that she would spend the next 36 years studying about community college leadership through the doctoral level, lobbying for community college issues, and serving in multiple capacities in seven community colleges across three regions of the country.



On July 5, Audrey will retire from the Peralta Community College District where she spent the last 17 years as a staff member, an administrator, a faculty member, and the lead in major projects that have moved the District forward, both through grants she has administered and multiple accreditations she has led. But in her journey throughout the system, she had only one goal in mind—the students.

"Throughout all of my opportunities and challenges at community colleges," she says, "my philosophy and personal mission was driven by the goal of being able to make a difference in the lives of students, impacting the experience of students in the classroom, and influencing

positive changes in institutional culture and climate. "

In her 13 years at Merritt College, Audrey not only influenced students' lives as a faculty member in teaching Education and Learning Resources and directing the Learning Center (and coordinating its move and design), but has played so many roles in contributing to the overall welfare of the college that the list fills her multi-page resume. Among her major contributions, she co-authored and led the initial \$2 million Title III Comprehensive Development Grant and its renewals and is currently leading the efforts for Merritt's Accreditation Follow-Up Report.

Audrey is grateful for the mentors she has had along her career and thanks her colleagues at Merritt and throughout the District for their help in her success. "My accomplishments are shared experiences due to the work, collaboration, support, and the many helping hands of people who stepped up to assist and support me along the way," she says. "Those dedicated colleagues played a significant role in my ability to improve the educational experience of our students."

Now Audrey is looking forward to her move to Austin, Texas, where she'll enjoy her retirement (and lower cost of living!), focus on her health, read, relax, and move forward to accomplish personal goals and be of continuing service as she's done all of her life. She'll miss her work, but what she'll really miss is her colleagues. "The people at Merritt are my extended family," she said, confessing that she cried while writing her retirement letter. "It's like leaving home. You can't replace people."

But, in her heart, she knows it's time to leave. "My life has always been a journey of faith," she says. "Even when I didn't know how I was going to reach my next goal, I had faith and everything always worked out."
