labs, equipment, and furniture, not to mention outstanding views of the entire Bay Area from the top floor.

#### Faculty Spotlight

### New Academic Senate President's Diverse Upbringing Led to His Career

Growing up in a low-income North Oakland neighborhood, Mario Rivas would have probably been considered the least likely to succeed. He hung out in the streets, barely achieved a 1.5 GPA after 1-1/2 years at Laney, and was a self-described "light-weight thug."

But the things he instinctively learned — about diversity and respect, tolerance and perseverance, his personal strengths and his worst fears — would end up not only shaping

his life but contributing toward the self-esteem and success of thousands of students whose lives he would touch.

"My mother was a single parent who cleaned houses from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. every day so I could do something with my life to help poor people," says Rivas. "But it wasn't until I flunked out of Laney and was in the Air Force that I knew she was right."

After the service, Rivas entered Cal State Hayward as an EOPS student and earned a B.A. in psychology, then received an M.A. in counseling at SF State and a Ph.D. in counseling psychology at the University of Minnesota. His dissertation was on an academic and psychological intervention for underprepared minority students, and his job in UM's Martin Luther King advising office was serving as primary advisor for students of color.

Back in California his career began taking shape. He taught psychology at CSU Hayward, then at SF State was Director of Advising Services, started a learning center, then served as its Associate Dean of Undergraduate Studies. He then left to become VP of Student Services at BCC for seven years. Today at Merritt he is a much-loved psychology instructor where he is passionate about his work and his students. He also regularly speaks throughout the country on improving the achievement and learning success of students of color. His most prized achievement was his 5-year training at the Gestalt Institute in SF.

As the new Academic Senate President, Rivas says he will continue to encourage and support Merritt's dedicated faculty as they help students in this diverse institution achieve their goals in the classroom as well as develop the skills necessary to serve as leaders in making a difference throughout the community.

"Many of the kids at Merritt are from the inner city and grew up learning what I did on the streets, so I can identify with them," says Rivas. "My high school counselor told me I was never going to make it. I would never do that to students. They need guidance and support to be successful, and that's what I love to do."

### News of AJ's Pre-Academy Applauded



Anouncement of the college's new Law Enforcement Pre-Academy spread far and wide in a community that welcomes the opportunity to increase the number of "homegrown" police officers in Oakland.

A press conference led by the Pre-Academy's creator, Margaret Dixon, and instructor Howard Jordan, drew multiple media outlets as well as Oakland Mayor Libby Schaaf, law enforcement executives, Chancellor Jowel Laguerre, President Norma Ambriz-Galaviz, and AJ students.



This 13-week Pre-Academy, which started last week with a full class, will give Merritt students a leg-up when they have to go through the real police academy and will erase some of the barriers they face. Said Mayor Schaaf at the event: "We want to get more homegrown officers who can be compassionate and effective guardians of this community."

# Tobacco-Less Club President Leads the Effort for a 100% Smoke-Free Campus

If you see an event happening at Merritt College, chances are pretty good that you will find Marlene Hurd there asking for support while standing behind a table filled with anti-smoking literature and a sign-up sheet.

As president of Merritt's Tobacco-Less Club, Marlene has taken the lead in turning Merritt

into a 100% Smoke-Free Campus, following Laney and Berkeley City College. (For now, there are designated smoking signs at Merritt which are not always adhered to.) For the past

year, Marlene and club advocates have been taking the necessary steps to get the college's buy-in and present it to the Board of Trustees for approval.

"I don't want to see smokers endanger their lives, and I don't want others to breathe in secondhand smoke from cigarettes or ecigarettes," says Marlene. "I want to build the facts and get support."

She's glad to say she already has many positive votes, including several District administrators, President Ambriz-Galaviz, and the Classified Senate who "fully support any initiative that will promote a healthy and safe working environment."

To further promote this issue, Marlene has applied for a \$5,000 Legacy Smoke-Free and Tobacco-Free Community College Grant Initiative offered by the American College Health Association.

Marlene's efforts have also been recognized outside of campus when she recently received an award from the

Alameda Tobacco Control Coalition (ATCC) for her dedication to making the District's colleges smoke-free and impacting so many students.

"If we can save one person's life by educating them on the dangers of smoking and second-hand smoke," says Marlene, "this effort will all be worthwhile."
