Veterans Services

The Veterans Services Program provides assistance to veterans and their dependents who may be eligible for various educational benefits. Umoja/Sankofa

Umoja/Sankofa is an exciting initiative at Merritt College. Although the primary focus of the program is on the achievement of African-American students, Umoja/Sankofa's services are open to all students who desire the nurturing services offered by the program. The emphasis of the program is successful completion of English, mathematics, science, and information technology courses, while at the same time assisting students in exploring STEM disciplines and other subject areas as they prepare for their careers. Umoja/Sankofa assists students in the development of Student Educational Plans (SEPs), selection of courses, addressing personal concerns, and connecting students to support services across the Merritt campus.

Adelante Summer Bridge

The four-week program focused on college success and career exploration, with classes in English and Counseling, and a chance to make new friends. "Our mission is to provide a supporting and caring environment to these students who we recruited from Oakland feeder high schools, the majority from underserved populations," says Counselor Rosa Perez, who coordinated the program with the help of Dr. Marty Zielke. "We were so proud to participate in their graduation celebration, and now to see them walking around campus is a great feeling."

Centro Latino

Centro Latino Services at Merritt College is committed to providing support services to students from various ethnic, cultural, and linguistic backgrounds who desire to pursue higher education. While collaborating with other programs on campus and surrounding communities, the Centro Latino will focus on outreach, recruitment, and retention of Chicano/Latino communities. Our vision is to create educational opportunities for students of underrepresented backgrounds that will help increase their resources, skills, desire for lifelong learning, and enhance their quality of life through education.

First-Year Experience

Puente Program

The Puente Project is a transfer support program designed to increase thenumber of educationally underrepresented students who:

- Enroll in four-year colleges and universities
- Earn college degrees
- And return to their communities as mentors and leaders

Puente means "*bridge*" in Spanish. As the name suggests, we help students build bridges to higher education. Puente is an award-winning program that has helped thousands of students reach their dreams of college success through its innovative combination of accelerated writing instruction, intensive academic counseling and mentoring. Puente is co-sponsored by the California Community Colleges and the University of California system.

CalWORKs

Merritt College collaborates with neighboring county social services departments for the purpose of helping families with dependent children to transition from receiving public assistance to becoming self-sufficient in the work force. The CalWORKs department strives to encourage a positive environment where students who are part of the county's CalWORKs program can seek support.

The CalWORKs program provides case management services to students who are enrolled in classes and currently receiving aid for dependent children on an ongoing basis as they pursue their academic goals. Students are to have a minimum two appointments per semester with the academic counselor to ensure proper progress towards their county approved educational program.

Services are coordinated with the local county employment counselors and CalWORKs staff to ensure completion of both county and college forms. Communication with the county employees is established to make sure that students have the proper ancillary funds as eligible from the county so that students may obtain books, supplies, transportation, and childcare in order to succeed in college.



EOPS/CARE

Extended Opportunity Programs and Services (**EOPS**) is a state-funded program designed to ensure campus access and provide support services to students who face economic, language, and social barriers and who are historically under-represented in higher education. EOPS assists students who participate in the program to attain their educational and career goals as they prepare to enter an increasingly technological and multicultural society. Our goal is to support and enable EOPS students' through a comprehensive program of services. For a list of EOPS services and eligibility requirements, please go to the links on the left.

Cooperative Agencies Resources for Education (**CARE**) is a subset of EOPS, designed to provide extra educational support services to EOPS students who are also single parents receiving CalWORKs cash aid. CARE may provide you with some or all of these benefits: academic, career, and personal counseling; peer advising; CARE grants; tutoring; referrals; transportation; book vouchers; assistance with school supplies; daily meal services; awards luncheon; and coverage of some student fees. <u>Click HERE</u> for eligibility requirements.

<u>NextUp</u>

Foster Youth Support Services helps to provide a smooth transition to college for current and former foster youth students at Merritt College. Our goal is to create an engaging, inclusive, and equitable community in which current and former foster youth can attain their educational, career, and personal goals. We aim to provide a "One-Stop-Shop" that offers personalized assistance with educational goals by offering holistic services such as academic counseling, personal support, book grants, and referrals to community resources. We strive to engage and connect our students to campus life and ensure a sense of belonging that will create opportunities for you to achieve your goals. We are proud to have two programs serving foster youth:

NextUp is a supplemental program of the Extended Opportunity Programs and Services (EOPS) program. NextUp assists current or former foster youth whose dependency was established or continued by the court on or after the student's 16th birthday and are younger than 26 years of age at the beginning of the academic school year.

Guardian Scholars serves any current and former foster youth whose dependency was established or continued by the court

STEM-CORE

STEM-CORE is a cohort based learning community for Computer Science at Merritt College that seeks to increase the number of students in the field of Computer Science and Cybersecurity. Program participants take classes together, receive academic counseling, tutoring, intensive math preparation, and a chance to enter high-quality tech internships.



Street Scholars Peer Mentoring Program

At Merritt, Street Scholars offers peer-mentoring and an academic and student services support program focused on the academic success of formerly incarcerated and systems impacted students. Street Scholars was designed with the input of formerly incarcerated Merritt College students. Formerly incarcerated students also direct and facilitate our one-on-one and group mentoring processes, ensuring that formerly incarcerated and systems impacted men and women are understood and supported throughout their reentry, reintegration, and academic experience.

Street Scholars serves formerly incarcerated men and women enrolled at Merritt College (or one of the other three Peralta Colleges) who are either on probation or parole or have completed their community supervision but are facing challenges with their academic pursuits or achieving long-term stability in their community.
